## **MAYOR DANIELS DECLARES A LOCAL STATE OF EMERGENCY FOR THE CITY OF VIENNA**

**Declaration on page 2**

**DECLARATION OF LOCAL STATE OF EMERGENCY  
VIENNA, GEORGIA**

**WHEREAS**, Vienna, Georgia is expected to experience an event of critical significance as a result of the Novel Coronavirus 2019 ("COVID-19"); and,

**WHEREAS**, in the judgement of the Mayor of the City of Vienna, with advice from the Dooly county Health Department and the Dooly County Emergency Management Agency, there exist emergency circumstances in the City of Vienna, Georgia requiring extraordinary and immediate corrective actions for the protection of the health, safety and welfare of the citizens of the City of Vienna; and,

**WHEREAS**, to prevent or minimize injury or illness to people resulting from this event;


**NOW THEREFORE**, pursuant to the authority vested in me by local and state law;

**IT IS HEREBY DECLARED** that a Local State of Emergency exists and shall continue until the conditions requiring this declaration are abated.

**THEREFORE, IT IS ORDERED:**

- (1) That the City of Vienna Emergency Management Agency activates the Emergency Operations Plan;
- (2) That the City of Vienna Emergency Management Ordinance be operative;
- (3) That a mandatory curfew shall be effective between the hours of 10:00 PM – 7:00 AM during which all persons within the incorporated area of the City shall remain at home. The curfew shall not apply to anyone performing law enforcement services, emergency/first responder services, essential government services, health services, essential utility services, or anyone traveling to and from or engaging in lawful employment;
- (4) That all public or private Community Gatherings of more than ten (10) people anywhere within the incorporated area of the City of Vienna are prohibited for the duration of this Order;
- (5) Restaurants shall close to the public except to provide take out, delivery, drive-through, or curb-side service;
- (6) All other retail, commercial, or industrial establishments will be permitted to remain open subject to the following restrictions: (a) reasonable steps are taken to ensure that customers, employees, and other persons on the premises shall generally not be within six (6) feet of each other for longer than brief periods; and, (b) employees are not permitted to work if they are exhibiting symptoms of COVID-19 or residing with anybody exhibiting symptoms of COVID-19; and
- (7) This Order shall be effective commencing at 12:00 PM on March 24, 2020 and shall continue until further notice.



## **Georgia Power focuses on reliability and readiness as spring storm season arrives during COVID-19 pandemic**

Georgia Power remains committed to providing its 2.6 million customers safe and reliable service, while offering important safety tips and storm resources as the spring storm season arrives amid the COVID-19 pandemic. March, April and May are typically the most active months for severe thunderstorms with lightning, hail and tornadoes, though severe weather can happen at any time.

### **Storm Response Pandemic Preparations**

Georgia Power constantly monitors changing weather conditions and has been closely monitoring the potential threat posed by COVID-19 since January. The company remains prepared to respond to service interruptions that might occur because of severe weather while taking proactive actions including special distancing and other precautions to help protect customers and employees from the spread of the virus. The company regularly provides information and updates on the virus to employees, including prevention recommendations from the Centers for Disease Control, and is following the latest developments and updates from public health officials and medical professionals.

The company's investments in Smart Grid technology and increased automation in recent years mean an increased ability to more quickly isolate outages to smaller numbers of customers and reroute power remotely for improved reliability. In addition, the company's comprehensive pandemic plans ensure readiness of the critical personnel and facilities necessary to continue providing the safe and reliable energy customers expect and deserve.

In the field, the power restoration process includes these key steps:

**Assessing Conditions** – Responding crews – or in major storms, damage assessment teams – work to identify trouble spots and the resources needed to fix them, which could involve coming onto customers' property. Crews will employ appropriate distancing efforts and customers are asked to keep children and pets indoors and maintain safe distances from crew members as well.

**Making Repairs** – Georgia Power crews focus on repairs that return power to the greatest number of customers in the least amount of time.

### **Storm Safety**

Georgia Power reminds customers to keep safety first during severe weather and offers the following storm tips: **Before a Storm:** Stay aware and check the weather forecast before heading outdoors. Check your emergency kit, unplug major appliances and charge cell phones in case you lose power.

**During a Storm:** Take safe shelter inside a sturdy building away from windows and doors. Avoid contact with conductors of electricity - appliances, metal objects and water.

**After a Storm:** Never touch any downed or low-hanging wire, including telephone or TV wires that touch a power line. Never pull tree limbs off power lines or enter areas with debris or downed trees as downed power lines may be buried in wreckage.

**Remote Customer Resources:** Customers can subscribe to Georgia Power's **You Tube** Storm Channel for the latest safety videos and can connect with GA Power on **Facebook** and **Twitter** for helpful information every day, and restoration updates during severe weather.

- **Outage Alerts** – Subscribe to the free Georgia Power Outage Alert service to receive personalized notifications and updates via text message.
- **Outage Maps** - Customers can follow progress on outages in their town or across the state on the company's outage map available at [www.georgiapower.com/storm](http://www.georgiapower.com/storm) online or on the Georgia Power mobile app on your smartphone.
- **Build an Emergency Kit** – A well-built kit should contain enough supplies to get you and your family through three days without electricity or running water.

## **Tax Filing and Payment Deadline Extended**

The 2019 income tax filing and payment deadlines for all taxpayers who file and pay their Federal income taxes on April 15, 2020, are automatically extended until July 15, 2020. This relief applies to all individual returns, trusts, and corporations. This relief is automatic, taxpayers do not need to file any additional forms or call the IRS to qualify. This relief also includes estimated tax payments for tax year 2020 that are due on April 15, 2020. Penalties and interest will begin to accrue on any remaining unpaid balances as of July 16, 2020. You will automatically avoid interest and penalties on the taxes paid by July 15. Individual taxpayers who need additional time to file beyond the July 15 deadline can request a filing extension by filing Form 4868 through their tax professional, tax software or using the Free File link on IRS.gov. Businesses who need additional time must file Form 7004.

### How can I participate?

- **Local businesses** can make the extra effort to enhance the beauty of your own property by sweeping the sidewalks in front of your businesses; maintaining attractive window displays; keeping the grass mowed regularly; removing temporary/outdated signage and debris from your property; and continuing to maintain your structures.
- **Residents** should keep your property mowed, clear of debris, and also continue in maintaining your structures.
- **Property owners** should keep vacant lots mowed and cleared of debris and ensure rental property structures and lawns are maintained.
- **Community groups and organizations** can “adopt” an area to clean up. Just let us know the area and the date and time you plan to work.



By now, everyone should have received in the mail an invitation to respond to the 2020 Census giving you 3 options for responding— online, telephone, or mail. The questionnaire is very brief and only takes a few minutes to complete. A postage paid envelope is included if you choose to respond via mail.

Remember, the 2020 Census is ***Important, Safe, and Easy***

**Important** that every person in Vienna/Dooly County is counted.

- It determines how more than \$675 billion are spent supporting your state, county and community's vital programs.
- It's about fair representation. Every 10 years, the results of the census are used to reapportion the house of Representatives determining how many seats each state gets.

**Safe** because your information is confidential.

- By law your information cannot be shared with immigration enforcement agencies, law enforcement agencies, or allow it to be used to determine your eligibility for government benefits.

**Easy** because there are 3 simple ways to respond.

- Online
- Telephone
- U. S. Mail

If households do not complete the standard form in one of these 3 ways, a U.S. Census Bureau employee will visit up to 6 times in an effort to gather the information. In May, these individuals will begin knocking on doors of those who have not responded.

**GOAL:** *Every person in Vienna/Dooly County, counted only once and in the right place.*

## **Personal Transportation Vehicle Ordinance Enacted**

At the March 23, 2020 City Council Meeting, the Mayor and Council enacted the Personal Transportation Vehicle (PTV) Ordinance which pertains to any motor vehicle: (1) with a minimum of 4 wheels; (2) capable of a maximum level ground speed of less than 20 mph; (3) with a maximum gross vehicle unladen or empty weight of 1,375 pounds; and, (4) capable of transporting not more than eight persons.

## The Presidential Preference Primary Postponed

Due to the public health emergency caused by the Coronavirus, the **Presidential Preference Primary** originally scheduled for March 24 has been postponed until the **May 19 Primary Election**. This decision was made by Secretary of State Brad Raffensperger as a move to protect in-person voters and poll workers.

If you early voted or voted by mail in for March 24 Presidential Primary prior to the polls closing, you will be able to vote again in the May 19 Primary for elections already scheduled for that date. If you early voted for the March 24 Presidential Primary and **do not** vote again in the May 19 Primary, your vote for the Presidential Preference Primary will still count.

Also, mark your calendars to vote again in the **General Election** to be held on Tuesday, November 3, 2020.

# Eat Healthy and Enjoy it!



**Fresh, Frozen, or Canned Fruits** — don't think just apples or bananas. All fresh, frozen, or canned fruits are great choices. Be sure to try some "exotic" fruits, too. How about a mango? Or a juicy pineapple or kiwi fruit! When your favorite fresh fruits aren't in season, try a frozen, canned, or dried variety of a fresh fruit you enjoy. One caution about canned fruits is that they may contain added sugars or syrups. Be sure and choose canned varieties of fruit packed in water or in their own juice.

**Fresh, Frozen, or Canned Vegetables** — try something new. You may find that you love grilled vegetables or steamed vegetables with an herb you haven't tried like rosemary. You can sauté (panfry) vegetables in a non-stick pan with a small amount of cooking spray. Or try frozen or canned vegetables for a quick side dish—just microwave and serve. When trying canned vegetables, look for vegetables without added salt, butter, or cream sauces. Commit to going to the produce department and trying a new vegetable each week.

**Calcium-rich foods** — you may automatically think of a glass of low-fat or fat-free milk when someone says "eat more dairy products." But what about low-fat and fat-free yogurts without added sugars? These come in a wide variety of flavors and can be a great dessert substitute for those with a sweet tooth.

**A new twist on an old favorite** — if your favorite recipe calls for frying fish or breaded chicken, try healthier variations using baking or grilling. Maybe even try a recipe that uses dry beans in place of higher-fat meats. Ask around or search the internet and magazines for recipes with fewer calories — you might be surprised to find you have a new favorite dish!

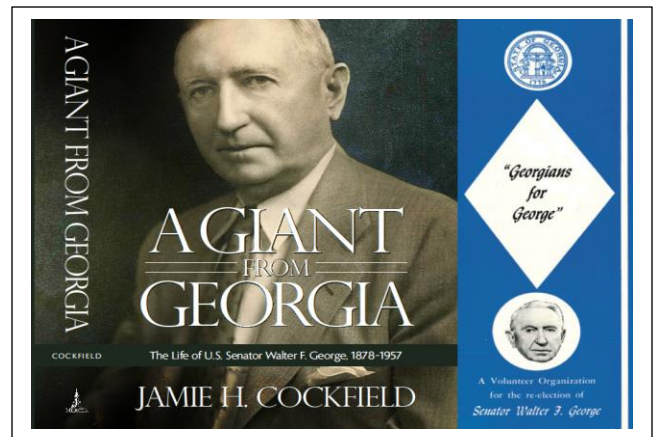


## Potential New Crop



Have you heard about Husk Cherries? Also commonly referred to as ground cherries or husk tomatoes, these cherries are small pale orange fruits wrapped in a crinkly, paper-like husk. Their flavor is mild, yet quite sweet and very unique. They have been compared to a cross between a tomato and a pineapple.

A team at Auburn University is working with Husk Cherries. This team is encouraging husk cherries as a new berry crop for the Southeast because it fills in a critical gap in fruit production when common fruits like strawberries, cranberries, and peaches are not in season. Husk cherries produce berries from May to October, and possibly even into November for the southern parts of Georgia and Alabama. Also, these berries grow well in sandy coastal plain soils, thriving in low nutrient conditions. Southeastern Growers are being encouraged to consider husk cherries for their farms. ## Joiner's Corner

### *The Waiting Room* by Neil Joiner

Waiting room protocol is something I'm never sure about. Is it polite to ask how someone in a doctor's office is doing? It's fine, perhaps, if they're having a routine physical, but what if their wraparound sunglasses are meant to deter unwanted inquiries? Smartphones have changed the rules of etiquette. Conversation was once considered courteous. Now, though, it seems intrusive to interrupt someone staring intently at a screen.

There was a time when I would peruse through layers of magazines to see what I had missed from two years earlier. That was before my wife convinced me that old magazines in doctors' offices are breeding grounds for bacteria. Before I approach the display rack now, I ask the receptionist for disposable rubber gloves and a mask, then I request a copy of the furniture sanitization schedule.

Occasionally there are still opportunities to meet people you don't know. I enjoyed a recent chat with two longtime senior citizens named John and Matt. I was in Macon with my mother who was having a CT scan. She had been called to the back when the two men ambled in. They stopped by the front desk then settled into chairs across the room from me, maybe 15 feet away. I don't know much about them other than John is 84, Matt is 83, and they've been friends for 40 years. John's a tall wiry fellow with thick gray hair and the tan of an outdoorsman. Matt's a big guy with a reddish beard who looks like he could put a charging bear in a full nelson. He wore a flannel shirt with blue jeans held up by red suspenders. It was like seeing Geritol's version of Grizzly Adams. John's vision isn't good, so Matt helped him fill out some paperwork. He took the forms back to the receptionist and said, "We can't pronounce some of these words, so I just answered no."

As Matt walked back toward his seat John called out to him, "Slow down! You're making me look bad!" I was amused at their lighthearted banter but too far away to comment without shouting. That's when John walked over near me to look out a window or maybe examine a painting on the wall. "That's a good line I overheard when you told your friend to slow down," I said. Matt was within earshot and spoke before John had a chance. "He says that to me all the time. He's jealous because of my youthfulness." We shook hands and introduced ourselves. That's when I learned their age difference is measured by months.

"I was in good shape a few years ago," said John. "At 76 I climbed up an old sugarberry tree with ropes so I could take it down from the top. People a lot older than me remembered the tree being there when they were young." John talked about sawing his way down until he was about 25 feet off the ground. "It was rotten at the bottom," he said, "but there was a small green part inside that kept the top of the tree alive." He finished the job without a hitch, but his tree climbing days were winding down.

Matt told me he used to deliver chickens to grocery stores in Dooly County. He fondly remembered Mr. Smith Dennard in Unadilla. "I hauled chickens there before he built the new store," he said. "I wore a cowboy hat back then. He liked it so much he asked me to get him two just like it." Matt paused for a second, then dryly added, "He wanted one for a chamber pot and one for a cover."

"I can't see well out of my right eye," said John. When I asked what happened, Matt explained that John's wife hit him with a frying pan. John laughed and corrected him: "Nope, that was my other eye." Then he said, "Tell me your name again. My memory doesn't work as well as it used to." "He had his mouth open when you told him before," Matt responded. "When John's mouth is open everything that goes in his ears passes on through." I confessed I often have that same problem.

If you see two weathered old men in a Macon waiting room, you might want to find a nearby chair. I'm glad I wasn't staring at my phone that day. I would have missed a charming portrait of friendship that's still being painted with strokes of gentle humor.
